COUNTERPARTS/THDNA BUSINESS MEETING 2023.

The 2023 Business Meeting was held on May 8 at the. Rushmore Hotel, Rapid City SD, in conjunction with the 2023 COUNTERPARTS Reunion.

Commander Grant McClure could not attend the reunion because of illness. Executive Officer Hank Choy called the meeting to order and proceeded with an agenda directed by Grant. Membership

John Haseman gave the update on membership. There are 138 lifetime members, 92 active yearly duespaying members, and three charter members for a total of 233. There are 784 on the roster with 376 active members. Once a member the name is never deleted. John reported that he has boxes full of historical data-DD 214s, pictures, medals certificates, etc. which could be digitalized and posted on web site. To access the data base on our web site, one must have a 10- digit password. Contact John with a password and he will set it up for you. Over one third of members do not have passwords. John also encouraged members to keep him updated on email/address changes. Individual dues are \$35 yearly and \$350 lifetime.

Dr. Ron Milan, from Texas Tech University, and a member of COUNTERPARTS, reminded us that Texas Tech is the repository/archives of the Vietnam War. He encouraged members to arrange for an oral interview with Texas Tech. Contact oral historian Kelly E Crager, Ph.D. at <u>Kelly.crager@ttu.edu</u> or Joseph H. Carpenter, MA at joseph.carpenter@ttu.edu. All three were attendees at the reunion. Also, see <u>www.vietnam.ttu.edu</u>. Dr Milan, a member from Tm 36, also requested an authorization from COUNTERPARTS to archive 4 large boxes of documents/papers that he took back to Texas Tech from the 2020 reunion. Permission was granted by executive officer Hank Choy.

XO Comments

Hank Choy commented on the Village Market and the cost of shipping the materials to reunions and looking for ways to expedite it. The new Co Van My patch hat that he designed (a collaborated effort between Commander Grant and XO Hank) received favorable comments. Hank led the design and production our new COUNTERPARTS coin. In addition to this we are looking into a vest and a survey will be coming out in our next SITREP to look into the idea of a vest as a Village Market item or an individual item.

SITREP

Editor Ken Jacobsen reported that he hopes to put out two editions of the newsletter every year but it depends on material received. He encouraged members to send in stories about their experiences. Ken has been putting out the SITREP for 30 years now since the beginning of COUNTERPARTS. He was also the commander for 6 years. The SITREP used to be printed free by Bui Lam, former ARVN officer, who had his own printing business. Since he has died, it now costs \$800 to print. Discussion was held to eliminate the mailed copies and go 100% digital-no decision was made. Once the SITREP is published, it is put on our website and that makes it available for anyone to read. It also means that the articles have become part of the history of the Vietnam war and can be searched via Google by title/author.

Rich Webster

Gave an update on The Vietnam Healing Foundation. For the last six years COUNTERPARTS has donated \$2500 to this worthwhile organization which distributes small sums of money to our fallen comrades in Vietnam who receive nothing from the present government. The VHF is run by R J Del Vecchio, a Vietnam Marine Corps vet, with a Board of Directors from the Vietnamese community in the Raleigh, NC area. Small grants of \$100 to \$200 are distributed to 300 former RVN soldiers several times a year. Pictures of former RVN soldiers, many without limbs were on display. See www. thevhf.org for more info. Members present voted to continue supporting this worthwhile organization. Hank Choy contributed and additional \$100. Membership voted to continue the funding with \$2500. See www.thevhf.org for more info. Terry Turner questioned the accountability of the funds being distributed in Vietnam. Rich said he would follow up with Director of the VHF for a detailed report.

<u>Historian</u>

Carol Lund, our Historian, reported on efforts to digitalize our reunion photos for the web site. Carol takes pictures of those attending the reunion and has individual albums for each year's reunions on display.

Cambodia Corps

Max Lund, Director of Cambodia Corps which COUNTERPARTS has contributed to since 2007 reported on new happenings in Cambodia with the organization. CCI provides college scholarships to 16 Montagnard girls from the two eastern provinces of Mondulkiri and Ratanakiri. CCI has a student- center house in Phnom Penh where 16 college- age girls live and travel with bicycles or motorbikes out to the various colleges. Approximate cost to educate a student is \$2000 to include room, board, and tuition. To date, CCI has provided a college education to 60 Montagnard girls and boys. CCI also supports 19 high school girls in a house in Ban Lung, Cambodia, so they can finish their high school education. Applicants are carefully screened via our Cambodia director *Siramaren* who visits their homes for personal interviews. CCI just received a grant from the World Conservation Society to support 5 additional girls from Mondulkiri Province. One student presented a program at a UN conference in Paris recently. Tom Green made a motion to increase COUNTERPARTS funding to \$5000. Rex Lathan seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously by members present. See <u>www.cambodiacorps.org</u>. for more info. Member Lou Rothenstein suggested that Max send an article to the special force's organization regarding CCI.

Treasurers Report

Jim O'Malley reported that COUNTERPARTS has \$16,635 in the bank after this year's Reunion expenses and our yearly donations to charities. At last year's reunion there was a profit made of \$1306. The extra profit made from the reunions goes to fund the charities we support. Terry Turner commented on the newly installed MACV memorial plaque on the" Path of Remembrance" at the

National Museum of the US Army. Donations have been received for the cost which was \$5000. Donations can still be made in memory of adviser teams or individuals. Members can check <u>www.armyhistory.causevox.com</u> to donate.

Reunion Coordinator

Steve King reported that this was the biggest reunion ever with 93 total attendees. The breakdown of attendees: 5 advisors from the Sa Dec Province group, 48 Counterpart members, 25 wives, 7 guests, and eleven family members attending the banquet. Michael Ellsworth, tm 55, MAT 102 reported that he would host guest Sue Richardson, at the Banquet. She is the daughter of an advisor who was killed on his 3rd tour of duty. She never knew her father but wanted to meet someone on his team. Michael was on her father's team.

2024 Reunion

COUNTERPART member Len Ganz volunteered to host the reunion at Fort Benning, {newly named Fort Moore), next year from April 24th to April 27 on what the Vietnamese community in America refer to as Black April. Dave Priddy announced that he persuaded COUNTERPARTS member Tom Vo, former *Trung Uy* and pilot, to put off his bid to host next year's reunion until April 20-25, 2025, which will be the 50th anniversary of the fall of Saigon. Tom will host this reunion in Westminster, California, and liaison with many of the South Vietnamese organizations who will be participating in the solemn event.

Subsequent to the Reunion Treasurers Report, Treasurer Jim Malley submitted this additional information:

I hope that I didn't give a wrong picture of our cash position. The one I stated at the reunion was before reunion expenses and the donations we made. After all that our remaining balance is \$16,635 which is about where we stand every year, the reunion made around \$4,000 so that helped. As I have said before at some point we will probably have to scale back but as of now we are fine, we will get dues income throughout the year and probably several life memberships so my guess is if the next reunion makes a small profit we will have about \$20,000 available for donations, still enough to fund at our present level or we might consider cutting back to extend our ability to

continue to pay. I would recommend that the SITREP state our cash position as \$16,635 which is the actual position after all expenses for the reunion and donations.

Cambodia Corps Update Summer 2023

We begin our update with sad and frustrating news. There was an attack on 11 June 23 by an unknown group in Viet Nam, Dak Lak province at two commune offices. Communist officials immediately responded with overwhelming force, arresting at least eighty-four Montagnards on suspicion of involvement. Christian Montagnards are fearing government reprisals will soon be directed at them.

It continues to be a frustrating situation to see our loyal allies subjected to communist oppression while our government seemingly stands by. They are being denied basic human rights simply because of their past loyalty to the US. Our mission remains as important today as when we began in 1999. "To help the Montagnard help themselves through education".

On a much more positive note, our first trip back since the pandemic was the best yet. Our two, star students, Munny and Leap, who have parlayed their volunteer work into representing the Indigenous People of northeast Cambodia in two international conferences, continue to set the pace for our other students. To begin with, all your students are motivated and hardworking thanks to our careful screening and selection, but these students, seeing one of their own accomplish even more has set a new standard for the kids. We look for more volunteerism to soon follow. As we were departing for

home, Leap was notified that she had been selected to join the United States Ambassador's Youth Advisory Council. Yet another accolade. To top that off, last week Leap was notified she was being sponsored to attend the Asian Undergraduate Symposium in Singapore. This program, your program, of scholarship education to help our Montagnard friends that you all have so generously supported is making a real difference. Thank you. And last, but not least, CCi was contacted by Wildlife Conservation Society, a worldwide organization. They are involved in administering and protecting a huge sanctuary in eastern Cambodia (660,000 ha or 1,452,000 acres) Keo Seima Wildlife Sanctuary, on the border, opposite Tay Nin province in Viet Nam. There are some twenty Montagnard hamlets and villages within the sanctuary. WCS is experiencing problems of illegal logging, poaching and mining. Often the criminals recruit the Indigenous People as laborers to help them. To counteract this, WCS has decided upon a program of education for the sanctuary

inhabitants, to teach them to help protect the forest they live in and depend upon.

Due to CCi's success in educating and placing our students in jobs which benefit their community, WCS approached us seeking a proposal for a similar program tailored to their situation. We have agreed on a partnership in which we will use our format of screening and selection as well as written commitments from poor but capable students who will then return to their communities and use their education to benefit their people.

We will continue to emphasize the fields of education and health care for the WCS students, but also promote ecology, environmental studies, forest management, sustained development, and ecotourism. WCS will directly support the students from the sanctuary. There will be no cost to CCi, but rather our manager will now have a paid part-time student assistant to help administer the additional workload.

This is a win-win situation. Our program gains five more college level students who will pledge to return to their community upon graduation, our effective reach will extend into new territory creating more role models for the Montagnard people and we continue to give back to our loyal friends who supported us so long ago (although it still seems like yesterday).

Remember Mike Benge's words, "If it were not for the Montagnard supporting us there would be many more names on that black granite wall in DC"

On behalf of your students, myself, Carol, Rich and Lewis, thank you.

Vietnam In Their Words: A Bearable Likeness of Truth. Jim Barker (Self-published. Contact Jim Barker by email *erodemango@yahoo.com*) or telephone: (669)-216-9667. \$15.00.

COUNTERPARTS Charter Member Jim Barker has written and published a booklet that showcases his remarkable fluency in the Vietnamese language. Entitled "*Vietnam in Their Words: A Bearable Likeness of Truth,*" Jim collected verbal vignettes of his conversations -- in Vietnamese, both Northern and Southern dialects -- with a wide range of Vietnamese people. Ranging from his arrival as a young radio intercept operator and analyst through his many post-war return trips to Vietnam, each short vignette reveals the importance of true inter-personal communication and the ideas and revelations that come from people-to-people contacts.

His contacts covered every aspect of Vietnam in those early wartime years as a young soldier to the many people he met in his work across a variety of NGO and private programs to improve knowledge and peoples' lives. Whether interrogating captured enemy POWs, working on behalf of Amerasian children, or working to receive and resettle boat people and political refugees, or running post-war marathon races in Saigon and Hanoi, Jim had an amazing ability to go one-on-one with a full range of Vietnamese people.

A heartwarming addition at the end of the booklet are several of Jim's poetry compositions, which, in Jim's words, ". . . illustrates some of the deep personal connection beyond words many of us have with the Vietnam Experience."

I thoroughly enjoyed reading through Jim's variety of personal experiences. Jim's booklet is short in length (less than 70 pages) but full of a range of American-Vietnamese people-to-people experiences made possible by his fluency in the Vietnamese language. The Green Berets in the Land of a Million Elephants. Joseph Celeski's book on Green Berets in Laos, from the early days. 313 pages. Casemate publishing. With photos. Author Col. (Ret.) Joseph Celeski is a 30-year veteran of Special Forces though he did not serve in Laos during time period examined. The book is amply documented with many footnotes and photos. This is one of the only books to thoroughly examine the *White Start* program in Laos in early 60s prior to the Laotian Neutrality Agreements of '62.
