



'A great chain of events has resulted since I first joined COUNTERPARTS/TUONG HUU DONG NAM A and found an old friend, Col. Lê Nguyen Binh, was already a member. I wroted Binh right away, and he called



me as soon as he received my letter, happy that we had found each other again, having served together at different times between 1964 and 1974. Col. Binh also informed me that another old friend, Col. Trân Văn Phuc, was also in the Beattle area. I called him immediately and had a very welcome phone reunion, despite hearing that Phuc had spent 12 years in a communist prison. The ball kept rolling. Phuc told me that yet another friend, Col. Huynh Van Chinh was in the Atlanta area, and I subsequently called him too, and had a happy and uplifting talk. Chinh was also delighted to speak with my wife, Alina, to whom he introduced me back in '73. Binh, Phuc, Chinh and I have since exchanged many letters and family pictures, and plan to get together in person. Chinh also spent 12 years in prison.

It doesn't end here. Phuc also gave me a phone number where I could reach Le Van Hoi, who was visiting the US from Australia. Hoi came nearby to visit one of his sons, and we had a grand reunion in person. The final happy occasion came in the form of a phone call from another old Counterpart, Gen. Le Minh Dao, with whom I served in Chudng Thiên

in 1968. I had not seen him since 1974, though we had made contact after he arrived in the US following his 17 years in prison, in North Viet Nam. Dao said he would be visiting in Santa Ana, so my wife and I flew down to see him, for q wonderful and emotional three-day reunion. Dao had a surprise for me, bringing along Vu Van Chuong, who had issued me my 'official' VN ID card back in '68 (note: a copy of Ed's 'official national ID card was reproduced in a previous SITREP, with his name clearly spelled Nguyen Van Metzner). Chuong later served with Dao in the 18th Div. All are close and valued friends who have only grown closer through the years.

All had tried to locate me through the years, as I had them, but had had no luck and about given up hope. We're all happy and fortunate to have gotten together again.

We also met Dao and Chuong's children and grandchildren, all of whom addressed Alina and me as Aunt Alina and Uncle Ed, a very emotional honor to cap off the great fortune of valued friends again, after so many years of wondering, and hoping they were still alive.

MPDATE on unresolved Locator search: By now everyone's heard of Tiger Woods, the youngest man to ever win the Master's Tounament and one of the more deservedly renowned, and polite, athletes in the country. Why the name Tiger?

Tiger's Father, Col.(ret.) Earl Woods, served in Ninh Thuân Province in 1969-1970. His Counterpart was Nguyên Phong, Dep. Prov. Chief, whom Earl nicknamed 'Tiger' as a reflection of Phong's dedication and courage. Earl Woods has long been searching for Nguyên Phong, and when his son was born, in 1976, Col. Woods decided to give his son golf training in the years to come, and if he ever became famous, Nguyên Phong might hear, associate his own nickname with the last name of his former Counterpart, and thereby reestablish contact. No luck yet, but still trying. Congratulations to young Tiger for his sucess, congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Woods for raising such an admirable

congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Woods for raising such an admirable and dignified son, in this day/age of snot-athletes, and let's all hope Nguyen Phong can be found, as fitting conclusion to this story.

BOAT PEOPLE The human tragedy was not prevented, and at this writing the refugee camps are being closed as forced repatriation is underway. This was a blatant and mutant melding of expediency, amorality, and political convenience, at the expense of common decency. The UN refugee screening program was irrefutably documented to be rife with corruption and incompetence, with legitimate candidates for political asylum being routinely 'screened out'. A dedicated letter

writing campaign, Led by Dr. Nguyen Van Thang and his noble staff at the Boat People Rescue Committee, was dismissed in smug, cavaliere fashion, with one Congressmen even circulating a letter that Boat People were 'Economic Refugees from Ha Noi'. A recent GAO report, dated Dec 1996 reeks with the rancid stench of bureaucratic sloth. The report ostensibly determines that no violations of ethical screening procedures could be determined, essentially because there was insufficient information and data provided to GAO staffers to reach a sound conclusion. This is akin to saying the planet Jupiter does not exist because we have scant info and know very little about it.

Worse, in cases where a screening review was justified, the US Embassy 'did not respond to the other cases forwarded for review by the UN High Commissioner for Refugees', which was essential. So, because the US State Dept. did nothing, the case was closed, ending the review procedure, and determining without a doubt that the individuals in question were not bona fide political refugees. Now THAT'S logical.

In another case, an individual spent three years in hiding in two Catholic church compounds, after his presiding priest had been jailed. The case reviewer concluded that 'no church in Viet Nam would harbor possible criminals'(go ahead and read it again-it still will not make any sense at all), therefore the candidate was not a political refugee. A note here: it is a documented fact that Hanoi severely limits the ordination of new priests, putting the slow squeeze on free practice of and belief in a religion.

Further, the track record of 35 interviewers in Philippine camps was examined, and reveled to be a paragon of illogical inconsistancy. Interviewer rejection rates ranged from 0.0% to 78%. So, one screener says none of his applicants should be denied, while another said 78% should be...and another said 32%...and another said 45%...and another saidl5%. This has all the characteristics of utter slipshod idiocy at work.
